


BUILD A BUG HOTEL

- Practice sorting and building using natural materials
- Develop observation and documentation skills through journaling
- Cultivate mindfulness, empathy, and appreciation for tiny creatures





WELCOME TO YOUR BUG HOTEL ADVENTURE!



Bugs are builders, cleaners, pollinators, and protectors of the earth - and they deserve a cozy place to stay!

In this project, you'll design a bug hotel from natural materials you can find in your yard, garden, or park. No two hotels are the same - that's the fun of it! Whether you create a five-star luxury lodge or a hidden bug cave, you're helping nature and building STEM skills at the same time.



So gather your supplies, grab your journal, and let's build something beautiful for our tiny friends.

HOW TO BUILD A BUG HOTEL



Step 1: Choose your base: A small wooden box, flower pot, or shoebox works great.



Step 2: Gather materials: Sticks, leaves, bark, pinecones, rocks, grass, seed pods.

Step 3: Sort and layer: Group similar items into little “rooms.”

Step 4: Add personality: Name your hotel, decorate the sides, or add a sign!

Step 5: Find a home: Place it in a shady spot near plants or trees.

Step 6: Observe: Be patient. Bugs will come if you let nature do the rest!

Bug Tip: Some bugs love dark, damp spaces while others like it warm and dry. Include a variety of materials in your hotel to attract different guests!

NATURE JOURNAL PROMPTS



- Draw what your bug hotel looks like today.
- What materials did you use?
- What's the busiest part of your hotel?
- If you could shrink down and stay in your bug hotel, what would it be like?
- What do you think bugs do all day?
- What colors do you see on the bugs near your hotel?
- How do the bugs move? (Crawl? Jump? Wiggle?)
- Which “room” in your hotel seems most popular? Why do you think that is?
- Can you identify any of the bugs using a guide or field app?
- What materials in your hotel seem to attract more bugs?
- If you were a bug staying in the hotel, which room would you choose and why?
- Draw a bug family checking into your hotel. What are their names?
- Write a short story or comic strip about a day in the life of a bug guest.
- What would you pack for a vacation if you were a bug visiting this hotel?
- What changes would you make to your hotel after watching it for a week?

DID YOU KNOW?



- Ladybugs eat garden pests like aphids - they're nature's helpers!
- Roly-polies aren't insects - they're crustaceans!
- Ants leave scent trails to help others find food.
- Some beetles glow in the dark.
- Earthworms help plants grow by turning soil.
- Ants can lift objects 50x their body weight - that's like a kid lifting a car!
- Butterflies "taste" with their feet to decide if a plant is safe to lay eggs on.
- Some insects, like butterflies and beetles, go through metamorphosis - transforming from egg to larva to adult.
- Worms have five hearts - and no lungs! They breathe through their skin.



“I am patient like a spider spinning a web.”


“Every bug has a place in nature and so do
